It's good for the river and it's good for the flood plain. People like the rivers to stay put. In short, if we weren't such control freaks, our environment would be a lot better off.

In summary, to save a species it is not necessary to save every member of that species. To save a habitat, the worst approach is to attempt to isolate it from all change.

To be effective, I believe we need to fundamentally reassess how we protect and manage our natural resources.
