Okay - So here's what I know - and a little opinion for spice.

Governor Scott did in fact issue directives asking staff to speak from a sound scientific basis rather than supposition. Oddly, I also found a very similar memorandum dated March 9 2009 giving approximately the same direction to federal staff. It is signed by President Obama (see link below). I also learned that the instruction from Gov Scott was actually issued in 2011.

So - let's tease this apart.
