The Quandary Surrounding Abortion

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Both the pro-life and the pro-choice camps have put forth arguments for their position. Both the pro-life and the pro-choice camps have reduced those arguments to slogans: Right to Life, and Right to Choose. Both sides agree that when either the mother or the baby's life must end, then, under most circumstances, an abortion is called for.

Neither of them, however, really expose the ultimate quandary.
